

DR. GAI FERDON

**SERVICE THROUGH SCHOLARSHIP:
INTEGRATING FAITH, LEARNING AND
ERUDITION WITH SOCIETAL CHANGE**



Dr. Ferdon will be discussing the critical role of Christian scholars and leaders who seek to integrate into their academic specialties and vocations the authority of Biblical truths, who stand firm with ethical integrity, who endorse excellence in erudition, and who advance a world-changing attitude and reformist vision within the context of a Biblical Christian Worldview. Her presentation will emphasize

the necessity of anchoring a philosophy and methodology of education within Biblical Christian propositions and principles, which apply across the academic spectrum, and incorporate all relational and institutional constructs, including civil government, and the nature of property, with a specific focus upon life-giving solutions to social and economic problems. Dr. Ferdon will draw upon her own life-experiences as a missionary and teacher in various parts of the communist world, including Zimbabwe, and former Czechoslovakia, and language student in the former Soviet Union.

Dr. Ferdon was born in Portage, Wisconsin. Her educational background has been interspersed with life-changing missionary experiences and teaching positions in many interesting and intriguing parts of the world, such as Zimbabwe-Rhodesia, the former Soviet Union, former Czechoslovakia, Romania, and various parts of Western Europe. Dr. Ferdon received her Bachelor's degree from Indiana Wesleyan University, a Master's degree from Regent University and her Ph.D. in British Political Thought from the University of Leicester, UK. She joined the faculty at Liberty University in Virginia in 2007 and is currently an Associate Professor of Government. Her publications include: *Constitutional Government and Free Enterprise: A Biblical Christian Worldview Emphasis and Interactive Notes*, *The Political Use of the Bible in Early Modern Britain: Royalists, Republicans, Fifth Monarchists and Levellers*, and *A Republic If You Can Keep It: America's Authentic Liberty Confronts Contemporary Counterfeits*.

Dr. Ferdon and the panelists will broach issues of liberty and jurisdiction in contrast to civil tyranny and totalitarianism, leading to a discussion on principles of civil liberty and religious liberty, and liberty of conscience stemming from the Protestant Reformation and its impact upon the British Isles and American colonization. Highlights would include liberty principles for societal structuring, especially that of transcendent truths, constitution crafting, and limited civil-government, which include an emphasis upon the broad nature of property. Inalienable rights will also be emphasized, bearing in mind that these principles are universal in nature and focus.




